Ricardo Estrada Middle School, formerly known as Ricardo Estrada Junior High School, opened it's doors in August 2010 and serves predominately economically disadvantaged families. Ricardo Estrada serves 705 students in grades 6th-8th. The average daily attendance is 97.02%. Our School-wide Title I program consists of various programs including intervention classes during Falcon Fridays, after school tutoring, Falcon Academies, and Super Saturday school. Tutoring is offered after school and on selected Saturday's in the areas of Math, Reading, Writing, Science and Social Studies. Our Title I and III aides service At Risk students throughout campus with an emphasis on our ELL population. Our Curriculum Coach trains teachers in best practices and data analysis as will as modeling lessons for teachers and providing professional development in various instructional strategies. Ricardo Estrada Middle School has a Communities in Schools Coordinator (CIS) that hosts parenting classes, assisting students with academics, bullying prevention, school involvement, and college readiness.

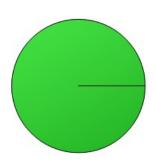

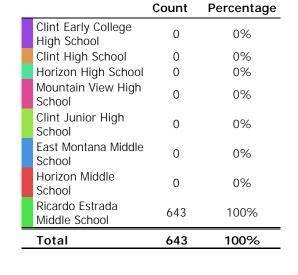

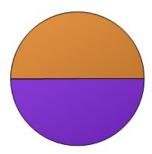


2) What is your grade level?



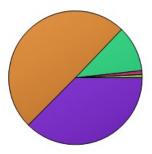

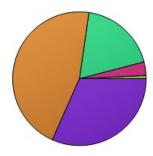

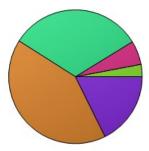

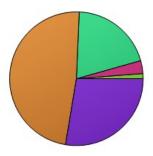

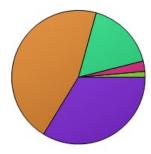

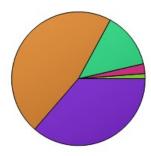

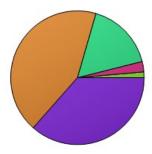

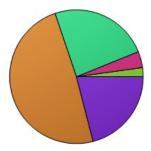
