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Desarrollo de protocolos de seguridad y salud

Los requisitos y las mejores prácticas continúan evolucionando con la disponibilidad de la vacuna COVID-19. La Agencia de Educación de Texas (TEA), los Centros para la Prevención del Control de Enfermedades (CDC) y el Departamento de Salud Pública de El Paso continúan divulgando información periódicamente, y el distrito seguirá revisando y perfeccionando los procesos internos. La administración del Distrito continuará monitoreando la situación actual y creará el mejor plan para nuestros estudiantes y empleados.

Clint ISD continúa implementando métodos de prevención efectivos que reducen significativamente los riesgos para los estudiantes, maestros, personal y sus familias. Este documento de orientación contiene información sobre prácticas que minimizan la probabilidad de propagación viral. Se recopiló información y aportes de la TEA, los CDC, el DSHS de Texas, el Departamento de Salud Pública de El Paso y el personal de Clint ISD para crear este documento.

**Los protocolos de salud y seguridad actuales están sujetos a ajustes. Si se realizan cambios, el distrito informará a los estudiantes, padres, maestros y personal.*

Como lo sugirió la Agencia de Educación de Texas, Clint ISD ha descrito prácticas para abordar:

- PREVENCIÓN: Prácticas para evitar que el virus ingrese a la escuela
- RESPONDER: Prácticas requeridas para responder a un caso confirmado por laboratorio en la escuela
- MITIGACIÓN: Prácticas para mitigar la probabilidad de propagación del COVID-19 dentro de la escuela

Para la seguridad de todos los estudiantes, el personal y los visitantes, es imperativo que todas las partes interesadas lean, comprendan y sigan los protocolos de salud y seguridad tal como se describen.

- Empleados: El incumplimiento de los protocolos de seguridad resultará en una acción disciplinaria.
- Estudiantes: Las escuelas trabajarán con los estudiantes para educarlos sobre los protocolos y se puede establecer un contrato de comportamiento si existe una desviación persistente.
- Visitantes: No se tolerará el incumplimiento de los protocolos de seguridad y es posible que se le pida al visitante que abandone la escuela o las instalaciones.



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Directrices sobre los síntomas de enfermedad

Las reglas estatales requieren que las escuelas excluyan a las personas con ciertas enfermedades de la escuela/trabajo por ciertos períodos de tiempo. Por ejemplo, si una persona tiene fiebre de más de 100.0 grados, debe permanecer fuera de la escuela hasta que no tenga fiebre durante 24 horas sin el uso de medicamentos para reducir la fiebre. Las personas con fiebre acompañada de tos y/o dolor de garganta deben ser evaluadas por un proveedor de atención médica para detectar enfermedades respiratorias. Las personas con enfermedades diarreicas deben quedarse en casa hasta que estén libres de diarrea sin el uso de medicamentos para suprimir la diarrea durante 24 horas.

Los estudiantes serán excluidos de la escuela por tener o sospechar que tienen una condición contagiosa enumerada en el [Código Administrativo 25 97.7\(a\)](#) hasta que se cumplan los criterios de readmisión para la condición. 25 TAC 97.7(a)

Si una persona se enferma durante el día escolar y la enfermera de la escuela determina que la persona debe irse a casa, la enfermera se comunicará con los padres/tutores para los estudiantes o el Departamento de Recursos Humanos para los empleados.

Pruebas de COVID-19

El distrito no proporcionará pruebas de COVID-19. Los estudiantes que están inscritos en [las Clínicas de Salud Escolares de Project Vida](#) pueden hacerse la prueba durante su cita para detectar infecciones de gripe, COVID-19 y faringitis estreptocócica si así lo determina el proveedor.

Si un estudiante o empleado tiene síntomas similares a los de COVID-19 o ha tenido un contacto cercano con una persona que es positiva para COVID-19, se le puede hacer la prueba en los sitios de prueba de la ciudad, en el consultorio del médico o en kits de prueba caseros. Los sitios de prueba de la ciudad se pueden encontrar en <https://www.epstrong.org/testing.php>

Si un estudiante o empleado da positivo por COVID-19, deberá enviar una copia del resultado de su prueba, una nota del médico o una imagen de la prueba casera etiquetada con el nombre de la persona, la fecha de nacimiento y la fecha de la prueba.

Los estudiantes positivos deberán cumplir con los criterios de regreso a la escuela para regresar a la escuela. Los empleados positivos deberán comunicarse con Recursos Humanos para obtener más orientación y recomendaciones.

Individuos positivos confirmados por prueba de COVID-19

Estudiantes

Los estudiantes que den positivo en la prueba de COVID-19 serán excluidas de asistir a la escuela bajo la [Administración de Texas 25 Código § 97.7](#) y pueden regresar cuando se haya cumplido con los criterios de regreso a la escuela según el [cuadro de enfermedades transmisibles para las escuelas del Departamento de Servicios de Salud del Estado](#).



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Criterios de regreso a la escuela para estudiantes sintomáticos positivos para COVID-19

1. Han pasado al menos 5 días desde la aparición de los síntomas
2. Sin fiebre (100.0 ° F) durante 24 horas sin el uso de medicamentos para reducir la fiebre
3. Mejora de los síntomas

Criterios de Regreso a la escuela para estudiantes Asintomáticos Positivos para COVID-19

1. Han pasado 5 días desde el día en que se les hizo la prueba, si siguen sin presentar síntomas.
2. Si el estudiante desarrolla síntomas después de dar positivo, el período de aislamiento de 5 días debe comenzar de nuevo. El día 0 es el primer día de síntomas. Siga los criterios de regreso a la escuela/trabajo para los individuos sintomáticos positivos de COVID-19.

Los estudiantes positivos deberán cumplir con los criterios de regreso a la escuela para regresar a la escuela.

Volver a participar en la banda de música de la UIL o en eventos deportivos

1. Los estudiantes pueden regresar a los eventos de UIL cuando hayan cumplido con los criterios de regreso a la escuela.

Empleados

Los empleados positivos deberán comunicarse con Recursos Humanos para obtener más orientación y recomendaciones.

Conferencia remota

Conferencia remota

Durante el período de exclusión por una enfermedad contagiosa, los estudiantes pueden recibir conferencias remotas. Esta opción es SOLAMENTE para estudiantes y debe discutirse con la administración del campus y la enfermera para obtener más información y una explicación de las limitaciones.

Reporte de casos

Casos positivos de COVID-19 confirmados por prueba

Texas DSHS: Las escuelas públicas de Texas ya no están obligadas a reportar casos positivos de COVID-19 en los campus escolares.

Condiciones notificables

Varias leyes de Texas {Código de Salud y Seguridad, Capítulos 81, 84 y 87} exigen que se proporcione información específica sobre condiciones notificables a los departamentos de salud locales y estatales (CEPDHP y TDSHS). Clint ISD continuará reportando casos de estudiantes o empleados que se sospecha que tienen una condición notificable según lo exige la ley (Capítulo 97, Título 25, Código Administrativo de Texas) al Departamento de Salud Pública de El Paso, de acuerdo con las leyes federales, estatales y estatales aplicables. leyes y regulaciones locales, incluidos los requisitos de confidencialidad de la Ley de Estadounidenses con Discapacidades (ADA) y la Ley de Privacidad y Derechos Educativos de la Familia (FERPA).



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Medidas de salud y seguridad

Prácticas de Bienestar

Clint ISD continuará manteniendo y promoviendo prácticas adecuadas de higiene de manos y bienestar en todo el distrito. Se alienta a los estudiantes, el personal y los visitantes a usar el lavado de manos adecuado y la etiqueta respiratoria (cubrirse al toser y estornudar).

Los conserjes de Clint ISD proporcionarán un entorno seguro para los estudiantes y empleados al continuar con las prácticas de desinfección y desinfección del distrito de nuestros edificios y aulas.

Equipo de protección personal:

Clint ISD ya no proporcionará equipo de protección personal. Cualquier estudiante o miembro del personal que quiera usar una máscara facial puede hacerlo.

Áreas comunes

- Las áreas como la sala de profesores, las salas de trabajo y las áreas de aprendizaje estarán abiertas a plena capacidad.
- Las cafeterías se pueden utilizar en los límites de capacidad normales.
- El flujo de tráfico en los pasillos volverá a la normalidad. Los campus deben garantizar un período de transición ordenado.
- Los patios de recreo estarán abiertos a plena capacidad para P.E. y recreo.
- Los procedimientos de baño de rutina se reanudarán a plena capacidad. La desinfección de los baños se realizará diariamente.
- Las fuentes de agua estarán disponibles para el uso de los estudiantes. Las estaciones de recarga, cuando corresponda, estarán disponibles para que los estudiantes rellenen sus botellas de agua.

Voluntarios

Los voluntarios pueden regresar a las tareas de voluntariado en los campus de Clint ISD. Los voluntarios deben seguir los procedimientos del distrito y ser autorizados por Recursos Humanos antes de ser voluntarios en un campus.

Padres y Visitantes

Los padres podrán visitar las escuelas y deberán seguir los procedimientos del distrito.

Ejercicios de seguridad

Se seguirán realizando simulacros de seguridad de acuerdo con la ley estatal.

Transporte

Se proporcionará transporte en autobús hacia y desde la escuela según las reglas de elegibilidad actuales. Los autobuses se utilizarán a plena capacidad. Ya no se requieren asientos asignados. Los autobuses se limpiarán a fondo todos los días.

TEA Public Health Guidance August 1, 2022



Public Health Guidance

August 1, 2022

Executive Order GA-38 (GA-38), which has the effect of state law under Section 418.012 of the Texas Government Code, requires Texas public school systems to operate during the COVID-19 pandemic in compliance with the published guidance of the Texas Education Agency (TEA). This document constitutes TEA's guidance under GA-38 and takes effect immediately, replacing all prior guidance.

Public school systems are to operate in compliance with existing state laws and regulations, including all executive orders issued by the governor of Texas in response to the COVID-19 pandemic that are currently in effect.

The following are examples of existing state laws and regulations applicable to the operations of Texas public school systems during the COVID-19 pandemic:

- If an individual who has been in a school is test-confirmed to have COVID-19, the school must notify its [local health department](#), in accordance with applicable federal, state and local laws and regulations, including confidentiality requirements of the [Americans with Disabilities Act \(ADA\)](#) and Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).
- Per GA-38, school systems cannot require students or staff to wear a mask. GA-38 addresses government-mandated face coverings in response to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- As provided in this [Department of State Health Services \(DSHS\) Rule](#), school systems must exclude students from attending school in person who have or are suspected of having COVID-19, and must immediately notify parents if this is determined while on campus. As noted in the rule, exclusion shall continue until the conditions for re-entry are met:
 - For children with symptoms, at least 5 days have passed since symptom onset, and fever free, and other symptoms have improved.
 - Children who test positive for COVID-19 but do not have any symptoms must stay home until at least 5 days after the day they were tested.
- Parents must ensure they do not send a child to school on campus if the child has COVID-19 symptoms or is test-confirmed with COVID-19, until the conditions for re-entry are met.

TEA recommends that public school systems consult with their local public health authorities and local legal counsel before making final decisions regarding implementation of the state requirements referenced by this guidance.

This guidance is subject to change as new information becomes available.

LOCAL HEALTH AUTHORITY COVID-19 UPDATED RECOMMENDATIONS FOR SCHOOLS K-12 (ACADEMIC YEAR 2022-2023)

UPDATED JULY 22, 2022

Recommendations for area schools K-12 will continue to evolve as we move through the COVID-19 pandemic. These recommendations are based on careful analysis of the most current local data. Its focus is protecting the health and well-being of students, teachers, and school staff in general.

Vaccination:

Vaccination against COVID-19 continues to be strongly recommended for all eligible individuals as the foundation and most effective of all public health preventive measures. All individuals are strongly recommended to be up to date with COVID-19 vaccination. Being up to date at this present time requires the completion of the primary series of vaccines along with all applicable booster doses if eligible.

Isolation and Quarantine:

Prompt identification of COVID-19 cases within schools is vital to prevent school outbreaks and preserve school operations. It is recommended to identify students, teachers and other staff who are symptomatic, to properly separate them from the rest of the class or coworkers and refer them for evaluation.

Schools are required to follow current Isolation protocols which applies to individuals who have symptoms and test positive for COVID-19, regardless of vaccination status. They should isolate for a minimum of 5 days and may end isolation if:

- At least 1 day (24 hours) has passed WITHOUT fever and the use of fever-reducing medications; AND
- Has shown improvement in symptoms.

Individuals who are sick with COVID-19 and continue to have fever or other symptoms without improvement after 5 days of isolation will need to continue in isolation until they meet the above criteria.

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Individuals who have NO symptoms but test positive for COVID-19 and have not been sick with COVID-19 within the last 90 days, should isolate for a minimum of 5-days from the date of the first positive specimen collected.

Quarantine is still recommended for 5 days for those who are unvaccinated and have not been sick with COVID-19 within the last 90 days; however, schools can keep exposed students within their classrooms if they are not exhibiting any symptoms. A strategy called cohorting is acceptable. It is applicable to congregate settings where immunizations rates are high.

Masking:

The use of a well-fitting mask consistently and correctly is another infection control layer that reduces the risk of spreading the virus that causes COVID-19. The use of face masks while indoors is recommended when the community risk level is High for those who want to continue wearing a mask. Anyone who chooses to wear a mask, regardless of current community level, should be supported in their decision.

The use of a well-fitting mask is also strongly recommended for the following 5 days after someone is released from Isolation from the COVID-19 disease.

Distancing:


Social Distancing is another layer within the prevention strategy that has become secondary and very difficult to follow due to inherent constraints of physical spaces within schools. When vaccination rates are high within the community, social distancing becomes less relevant and, in many instances, might not be applicable.

Reporting:

It is required for school districts to report to DPH the number of positive COVID-19 cases and absenteeism on a weekly basis. This will allow DPH to properly assess the COVID-19 situation within schools and to determine proper next steps should an outbreak be identified within a specific school.

Reporting procedures will be explained in detail to designated district nurse points of contact. Any unusual disease pattern or clusters can also be reported to epireporting@elpasotexas.gov.

Promote ventilation of classrooms and other indoor school areas. Continue with currently approved district policies and procedures regarding cleaning and disinfecting. Consider enhanced cleaning and disinfection of classrooms if COVID-19 cases have been reported.


Currently it is not recommended to block outdoor play areas or any other area due to a positive COVID-19 individual. Please follow your current policies and procedures regarding cleaning and disinfection.

Testing:

It is imperative that all symptomatic individuals be tested whether at school through a diagnostic testing program, any community testing program, or an FDA-approved at-home test

Schools may continue conducting screening and/or diagnostic testing should districts have available resources for a testing program at school. Testing performed at schools should be reported to DPH weekly to include the amount of testing performed and all positive results.

EXECUTIVE ORDER GA 38

Relating to the continued response to the COVID-19 disaster.

WHEREAS, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, issued a disaster proclamation on March 13, 2020, certifying under Section 418.014 of the Texas Government Code that the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) poses an imminent threat of disaster for all Texas counties; and

WHEREAS, in each subsequent month effective through today, I have renewed the COVID-19 disaster declaration for all Texas counties; and

WHEREAS, from March 2020 through May 2021, I issued a series of executive orders aimed at protecting the health and safety of Texans, ensuring uniformity throughout Texas, and achieving the least restrictive means of combatting the evolving threat to public health by adjusting social-distancing and other mitigation strategies; and

WHEREAS, combining into one executive order the requirements of several existing COVID-19 executive orders will further promote statewide uniformity and certainty; and

WHEREAS, as the COVID-19 pandemic continues, Texans are strongly encouraged as a matter of personal responsibility to consistently follow good hygiene, social-distancing, and other mitigation practices; and

WHEREAS, receiving a COVID-19 vaccine under an emergency use authorization is always voluntary in Texas and will never be mandated by the government, but it is strongly encouraged for those eligible to receive one; and

WHEREAS, state and local officials should continue to use every reasonable means to make the COVID-19 vaccine available for any eligible person who chooses to receive one; and

WHEREAS, in the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, the legislature charged the governor with the responsibility "for meeting ... the dangers to the state and people presented by disasters" under Section 418.011 of the Texas Government Code, and expressly granted the governor broad authority to fulfill that responsibility; and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.012, the "governor may issue executive orders ... hav[ing] the force and effect of law;" and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.016(a), the "governor may suspend the provisions of any regulatory statute prescribing the procedures for conduct of state business ... if strict compliance with the provisions ... would in any way prevent, hinder, or delay necessary action in coping with a disaster;" and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.018(c), the "governor may control ingress and egress to

and from a disaster area and the movement of persons and the occupancy of premises in the area;" and

WHEREAS, under Section 418.173, the legislature authorized as "an offense," punishable by a fine up to \$1,000, any "failure to comply with the [state emergency management plan] or with a rule, order, or ordinance adopted under the plan."

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Greg Abbott, Governor of Texas, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, do hereby order the following on a statewide basis effective immediately:

1. To ensure the continued availability of timely information about COVID-19 testing and hospital bed capacity that is crucial to efforts to cope with the COVID-19 disaster, the following requirements apply:
 - a. All hospitals licensed under Chapter 241 of the Texas Health and Safety Code, and all Texas state-run hospitals, except for psychiatric hospitals, shall submit to the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) daily reports of hospital bed capacity, in the manner prescribed by DSHS. DSHS shall promptly share this information with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).
 - b. Every public or private entity that is utilizing an FDA-approved test, including an emergency use authorization test, for human diagnostic purposes of COVID-19, shall submit to DSHS, as well as to the local health department, daily reports of all test results, both positive and negative. DSHS shall promptly share this information with the CDC.
2. To ensure that vaccines continue to be voluntary for all Texans and that Texans' private COVID-19-related health information continues to enjoy protection against compelled disclosure, in addition to new laws enacted by the legislature against so-called "vaccine passports," the following requirements apply:
 - a. No governmental entity can compel any individual to receive a COVID-19 vaccine administered under an emergency use authorization. I hereby suspend Section 81.082(f)(1) of the Texas Health and Safety Code to the extent necessary to ensure that no governmental entity can compel any individual to receive a COVID-19 vaccine administered under an emergency use authorization.
 - b. State agencies and political subdivisions shall not adopt or enforce any order, ordinance, policy, regulation, rule, or similar measure that requires an individual to provide, as a condition of receiving any service or entering any place, documentation regarding the individual's vaccination status for any COVID-19 vaccine administered under an emergency use authorization. I hereby suspend Section 81.085(i) of the Texas Health and Safety Code to the extent necessary to enforce this prohibition. This paragraph does not apply to any documentation requirements necessary for the administration of a COVID-19 vaccine.
 - c. Any public or private entity that is receiving or will receive public funds through any means, including grants, contracts, loans, or other disbursements of taxpayer money, shall not require a consumer to provide, as a condition of receiving any service or entering any place, documentation regarding the consumer's vaccination status for any COVID-19 vaccine administered under an emergency use authorization. No consumer may be denied entry to a facility financed

- in whole or in part by public funds for failure to provide documentation regarding the consumer's vaccination status for any COVID-19 vaccine administered under an emergency use authorization.
- d. Nothing in this executive order shall be construed to limit the ability of a nursing home, state supported living center, assisted living facility, or long-term care facility to require documentation of a resident's vaccination status for any COVID-19 vaccine.
 - e. This paragraph number 3 shall supersede any conflicting order issued by local officials in response to the COVID-19 disaster. I hereby suspend Sections 418.1015(b) and 418.108 of the Texas Government Code, Chapter 81, Subchapter E of the Texas Health and Safety Code, and any other relevant statutes, to the extent necessary to ensure that local officials do not impose restrictions in response to the COVID-19 disaster that are inconsistent with this executive order.
3. To ensure the ability of Texans to preserve livelihoods while protecting lives, the following requirements apply:
 - a. There are no COVID-19-related operating limits for any business or other establishment.
 - b. In areas where the COVID-19 transmission rate is high, individuals are encouraged to follow the safe practices they have already mastered, such as wearing face coverings over the nose and mouth wherever it is not feasible to maintain six feet of social distancing from another person not in the same household, but no person may be required by any jurisdiction to wear or to mandate the wearing of a face covering.
 - c. In providing or obtaining services, every person (including individuals, businesses, and other legal entities) is strongly encouraged to use good-faith efforts and available resources to follow the Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) health recommendations, found at www.dshs.texas.gov/coronavirus.
 - d. Nursing homes, state supported living centers, assisted living facilities, and long-term care facilities should follow guidance from the Texas Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) regarding visitations, and should follow infection control policies and practices set forth by HHSC, including minimizing the movement of staff between facilities whenever possible.
 - e. Public schools may operate as provided by, and under the minimum standard health protocols found in, guidance issued by the Texas Education Agency. Private schools and institutions of higher education are encouraged to establish similar standards.
 - f. County and municipal jails should follow guidance from the Texas Commission on Jail Standards regarding visitations.
 - g. As stated above, business activities and legal proceedings are free to proceed without COVID-19-related limitations imposed by local governmental entities or officials. This paragraph number 3 supersedes any conflicting local order in response to the COVID-19 disaster, and all relevant laws are suspended to the extent necessary to preclude any such inconsistent local orders. Pursuant to the legislature's command in Section 418.173 of the Texas Government Code and the State's emergency management plan, the imposition of any conflicting or inconsistent limitation by a local governmental entity or official constitutes a "failure to comply with" this executive order that is subject to a fine up to \$1,000.

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4. To further ensure that no governmental entity can mandate masks, the following requirements shall continue to apply:
 - a. No governmental entity, including a county, city, school district, and public health authority, and no governmental official may require any person to wear a face covering or to mandate that another person wear a face covering, provided, however, that:
 - i. state supported living centers, government-owned hospitals, and government-operated hospitals may continue to use appropriate policies regarding the wearing of face coverings; and
 - ii. the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, the Texas Juvenile Justice Department, and any county and municipal jails acting consistent with guidance by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards may continue to use appropriate policies regarding the wearing of face coverings.
 - b. This paragraph number 4 shall supersede any face-covering requirement imposed by any local governmental entity or official, except as explicitly provided in subparagraph number 4.a. To the extent necessary to ensure that local governmental entities or officials do not impose any such face-covering requirements, I hereby suspend the following:
 - i. Sections 418.1015(b) and 418.108 of the Texas Government Code;
 - ii. Chapter 81, Subchapter E of the Texas Health and Safety Code;
 - iii. Chapters 121, 122, and 341 of the Texas Health and Safety Code;
 - iv. Chapter 54 of the Texas Local Government Code; and
 - v. Any other statute invoked by any local governmental entity or official in support of a face-covering requirement.
5. Pursuant to the legislature's command in Section 418.173 of the Texas Government Code and the State's emergency management plan, the imposition of any such face-covering requirement by a local governmental entity or official constitutes a "failure to comply with" this executive order that is subject to a fine up to \$1,000.
- c. Even though face coverings cannot be mandated by any governmental entity, that does not prevent individuals from wearing one if they choose.
6. To further ensure uniformity statewide:
 - a. This executive order shall supersede any conflicting order issued by local officials in response to the COVID-19 disaster, but only to the extent that such a local order restricts services allowed by this executive order or allows gatherings restricted by this executive order. Pursuant to Section 418.016(a) of the Texas Government Code, I hereby suspend Sections 418.1015(b) and 418.108 of the Texas Government Code, Chapter 81, Subchapter E of the Texas Health and Safety Code, and any other relevant statutes, to the extent necessary to ensure that local officials do not impose restrictions in response to the

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- COVID-19 disaster that are inconsistent with this executive order, provided that local officials may enforce this executive order as well as local restrictions that are consistent with this executive order.
- b. Confinement in jail is not an available penalty for violating this executive order. To the extent any order issued by local officials in response to the COVID-19 disaster would allow confinement in jail as an available penalty for violating a COVID-19-related order, that order allowing confinement in jail is superseded, and I hereby suspend all relevant laws to the extent necessary to ensure that local officials do not confine people in jail for violating any executive order or local order issued in response to the COVID-19 disaster.

This executive order supersedes all pre-existing COVID-19-related executive orders and rescinds them in their entirety, except that it does not supersede or rescind Executive Orders GA-13 or GA-37. This executive order shall remain in effect and in full force unless it is modified, amended, rescinded, or superseded by the governor. This executive order may also be amended by proclamation of the governor.
